

Roper Technologies, Inc. U.S. Political Contributions Policy (“Roper Political Contribution Policy”)

This Policy applies to Roper Technologies, Inc. (“Roper,” or the “Company”) and its majority-owned subsidiaries (hereinafter, “subsidiaries”) regarding U.S. political activities, including political contributions at the federal, state and local levels, membership in trade associations, and lobbying activities. Any of such activities must be undertaken in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations, and in accordance with Roper’s Business Code of Ethics and Standards of Conduct (“Code of Ethics”) and the Roper Political Contribution Policy.

Corporate Political Contributions

Roper does not make political contributions at the parent company level to individual candidates, political committees or parties or participate in political activities, including efforts to influence a federal, state or local election, ballot measure or initiative. Roper’s subsidiaries are discouraged from engaging in such activities, but should any subsidiary do so, such activity must be in accordance with the Roper Political Contribution Policy. Furthermore, in the event that one of Roper’s subsidiaries desires to make a monetary political contribution in excess of \$5,000 (individually or in the aggregate in any calendar year), such contribution (i) must be confirmed by Roper’s General Counsel as being in compliance with all applicable laws, reporting requirements and the Roper Political Contribution Policy, (ii) requires the approval of Roper’s Chief Executive Officer, and (iii) shall be reported to the Nominating and Governance Committee of Roper’s Board of Directors.

Voluntary Employee Political Participation

Roper does not have a company-sponsored Political Action Committee (PAC). Furthermore, Roper employees may not make political contributions by or in the name of Roper or its subsidiaries. However, the Company respects the right of its employees to voluntarily use their own resources to contribute to a candidate or cause of their choice on their personal time and with their personal funds. Any such action must be in accordance with the Company’s Code of Ethics.

Participation in Trade Associations and Lobbying

Roper and its subsidiaries may belong to trade associations that advocate on major public policy issues of importance to them and the communities in which they operate, and not to advance any political purposes. Participation as members of these associations comes with the understanding that their membership does not represent agreement with the positions, views or objectives of the trade associations or of other members, but a belief that their support will help advance policy objectives aligned with the interests of Roper and its subsidiaries. While Roper and its subsidiaries do not generally engage in lobbying activities on their own behalf, Roper and its subsidiaries may lobby on behalf of issues that affect their businesses and operations, in compliance with the Code of Ethics and all federal, state and local laws concerning lobbying registration and reporting.

Transparency

We comply with the letter and spirit of all Federal and State laws governing political contributions and their reporting and disclosure requirements, and all such contributions are aggregated and published on an annual basis. We also publish trade association payments of \$25,000 or more and their non-tax-deductible portions on an annual basis.
